## WHAT WOULD A PRACTICE ACT MEAN?

The Ontario Professional Planners Institute has been in contact with OALA recently to discuss their intention to pursue self-regulation. OALA convened a task force to review OPPI's self-regulation initiative, and both organizations met in June for an initial dialogue. OALA has since followed up on that meeting with a letter to OPPI, detailing our issues and concerns about their plan to pursue a practice act. A copy of the letter OALA sent to OPPI follows at the bottom of this newsletter.

OALA has expressed its concern that, because of the significant overlap in the two professions, OPPI's self-regulation initiative may restrict the practice and business of Landscape Architecture in Ontario and negatively impact upon OALA members' ability to earn a living.

As you know, OALA has a title act – anyone in Ontario wishing to call themselves “landscape architect” must be a full member of OALA. These early discussions with OPPI have caused OALA to evaluate its own position on self-regulation. **We would like to hear members' views on the worthiness of OALA pursuing self-regulation.** What would it mean to you and your livelihood? There are pros and cons to consider. For example, self-regulation would require Landscape Architects to carry potentially costly insurance. In defining the profession for practice legislation, would LAs limit themselves, or does the absence of a practice act allow you more flexibility in your responses to a constantly changing society? Is the profession healthier without a practice act? Are you concerned that without a practice act, other professions could exclude Landscape Architects from some practice areas, or take over our areas of business when they move towards their own clearer standards? In order to protect our profession, **it's important we hear your comments and receive your feedback in defining our own practice.**

We will continue to monitor the situation with OPPI. At a minimum, OALA is asking OPPI for a provision for grandfathering OALA members who earn a substantial amount of their income from matters concerning land use planning. We are also asking for exemptions for OALA members where there is overlap. We will keep you apprised of further developments. OPPI expects to have a draft scope of practice in fall 2010 and they will be sharing it with OALA to gain our feedback.

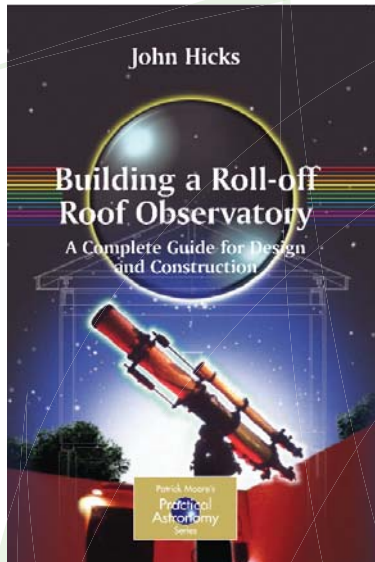
In the last newsletter we mentioned that George F. Dark, FCSLA will be inducted into the ASLA Class of 2010 The College of Fellows for the American Society of Landscape Architects, ASLA. The list of this year's inductees also include OALA members **James P. Ballantyne**, OALA, CSLA, ASLA, and **Greg Smallenberg**, OALA, CSLA, ASLA. The designation of Fellow is one of the ASLA's highest honours and is conferred on individuals in recognition of exceptional accomplishments over a sustained period of time.

**James Ballantyne**, nominated in the Knowledge Category by the ASLA Council of Fellows, has integrated digital design into landscape architecture for the past 20 years through his practice, research, and teaching. Among his successes in transforming the way landscape architects conceive and configure space and objects are the establishment of the first ASLA bulletin board; a system to automatically convert 2-D conceptual plans to working drawings; and the ASLA CADdetails product information web site. Cross-platform interoperability remains the main focus of Ballantyne's research into object-oriented automation of the landscape architectural process. The tools he derives from his work make it possible to evaluate the life-cycle effects of design and specification decisions in the studio on the fly.

**Greg Smallenberg** was nominated in the Works Category by the ASLA Council of Fellows Executive Committee. As a dynamic, influential leader of landscape architecture in Canada, he is a tireless promoter of the profession's duty to take a strong urban leadership role culturally, environmentally, socially, and politically. His award-winning parks, streetscapes, urban designs, memorials, waterfronts, plazas, historic renovations, campuses, and gardens have generated considerable public dialogue on public spaces as systems. His landscapes, wholly urban or partly natural, emerge as centers of a multidimensional experience and demonstrate integrated design thinking. In his plans, he effectively leverages the landscape as the element that best connects the various urban functions of resource management, civic gathering, work, and recreation.

### **Roof Observatory Design Manual**

John Hicks, OALA, has published a new book on constructing back yard observatories, written from the standpoint of a landscape architect. Since it is a "garden shed" of sorts and will be a future requirement by some homeowners-amateur astronomers, it fits the arena of landscape architecture (just as a gazebo would). Soon an OALA member may be asked by a client to solicit an architect for the design. Now you won't have to since one of your own has written a full design manual. The book is published by Springer USA ([springer.com](http://springer.com)). It contains a CD ROM with a full plan set. Requiring a little over two years, the work is a tribute to a landscape architect who is also an astronomer (solar astronomer). Both disciplines are required to write such a book and in fact it's a first from a landscape architect.

**Re: OPPI Self-Regulation (Registration) Initiative**

Dear Council and Professional Practice Advisory Group,

We are responding to the meeting we had together on June 28, 2010 to introduce the above initiative. Since that time we have had an opportunity to think about and meet to discuss your initiative more fully and contemplate its potential impact on the practice of our profession.

As we expressed during the meeting we are concerned that there is significant overlap in our two professions and your self-regulation initiative may restrict the practice and business of Landscape Architecture in Ontario. This may in turn negatively impact upon our members' ability to earn a living.

This has triggered new initiatives in our organization to evaluate our own position on OALA self-regulation. Given that the OPPI has been considering this matter for some time and your proposed legislation is expected to be drafted this fall, we request that your proposed legislation include a provision for **grandfathering** our members who earn a substantial amount of their income from matters concerning land use planning including but not limited to site planning, urban design, environmental planning, community planning, greenspace planning and recreation planning.

One of our new initiatives is to identify the areas of professional practice with our members.

We also ask that your proposed legislation include **exemptions** for our members where there is overlap.



We appreciate your willingness to meet and discuss your initiative with us and thank you in advance for your consideration of the above matters. We look forward to continuing the dialogue and to receiving an invitation to review and comment on your proposed legislation.
